

1970's

- 1) A Reduction in the Numbers
From 170,000 in 1970-71, To 52,500 in 1975-76
- 2) Greater Proportion From Asia
1966-1971 - 11.0%
1971-1974 - 23%
- 3) Emphasis on Skills and Qualifications, Rather Than Mass Recruitment of Unskilled Labour as in Previous Periods.
- 4) Record Intake From Britain, Possibly Because of 3.

41% British
