RUNNING AN organisation called You Have A Friend is usually about giving, begging food from generous local businesses or selling chocolate frogs to keep the charity - which feeds and clothes the Tweed region's homeless on a weekly basis - in existence.

This selfless service is run by Bilambil resident John Lee, who's keenly assisted by a band of active volunteers numbering around 113 if you include 40 school children and 25 teachers.

Imagine the surprise then, when recently, John was contacted by the Sydney-based Mamma Lena-Dino Gustin Foundation and told his 'friends' were going to be helped with a \$20,000 grant.

"I was gobsmacked," said John.

"Earlier this year we bought an 11-seater van to service the Chinderah/Kingscliff area - thanks to chocolate frog sales - and I thought it would be some time before we could afford to buy another to service villages like Uki, in the Tweed Valley," John said.

Addressing a 'friends' breakfast parents were Italian migrants in Budd Park, Murwillumbah last weekend, Rosalba Gustin - the daughter of the foundation's founders - told diners and volunteers she was very humbled by what she has seen during her first visit to the area.

"I was told by a friend of John's plight, and the hard work put in by his volunteers, plus the good work they do.

"After some enquiries I nagged my board for assistance.

The amount of passion i see in action, and the good being done, is phenomenal.

"The work is daunting ... I couldn't do it," she said, at the same time handing out snag sandwiches.

Rosalba, who was accompanied by her husband Peter, retired to the Gold Coast late last year and, as foundation's secretary, said she hoped other needy areas could be helped in SE Queensland and
